## 45th AFF Guest Artist: Los Texmaniacs

Combine a hefty helping of Tex-Mex conjunto, simmer with several parts Texas rock, add a daring dash of well-cured blues, R&B riffs, and you’ve cooked up the tasty Texmaniacs groove. Founded by Max Baca, the Texmaniacs are a product of his wide-ranging experience touring and recording with everyone from his father’s family conjunto, Flaco Jimenez, the original Texas Tornados, Los Super Seven, and even the Rolling Stones.

Max is a legend on the bajo sexto, using it to push the Texmaniacs sound to another level of vibrancy altogether. He displays a musical virtuosity and blistering guitar riff solo style that is now being emulated by young bajo players internationally and is being credited as turning a traditional folk/roots/conjunto instrument hip again, attracting young, new audiences. Max has appeared on Conan O’ Brien, David Letterman, Jay Leno, and Austin City Limits and has been featured in several PBS documentaries. In Los Texmaniacs, Max is accompanied by Josh Baca (accordion, vocals), Noel Hernandez (accordion, vocals), and Daniel De Laredo (percussion).

Los Texmaniacs won their first Grammy in 2010 for *Borders y Bailes* and their most recent release *Cruzando Borders* has just



been nominated for a 2019 Grammy for the best regional Mexican music album.

Like a great salsa the Texmaniacs mix the simplest yet finest ingredients of Texas music to create a sound solidly rooted in tradition while exploding with contemporary vitality. Los Texmaniacs have secured a rightful place in history as master musicians in their respective musical disciplines. So don’t just stay for supper-- make sure you stick around for dessert.

# Applications open! Apply by 5pm on March 1st

We know you're as excited as we are for this year's festival, so here are the many different ways you can apply to be a part of the festivities:

1. Apply directly on our website by filling out an online form. Simple, fast, and saves trees.
2. Download our applications as PDFs from the website, print, fill it in, and mail it back to us.
3. Contact us by mail, phone, or email ([info@akfolkfest.org](mailto:info@akfolkfest.org)) and request that we mail you a paper application form. We're happy to do so! Fill it out, and mail it back.

**All performance applications are due by March 1st, 5pm.** Workshop applications may be accepted past that deadline, but to give yourself the best chance at receiving a spot, the earlier you send it, the better.

When using the web form to apply, your submitted information

will be immediately entered into our database and a confirmation email will be sent back to you with a PDF copy of your completed form. This is for your records only. You cannot make changes after you submit the form, so prepare your entries carefully ahead of time. You are **REQUIRED** to submit a description.

Every year some disappointed musicians discover that they waited too long to apply. Don't let this be you. **The DEADLINE is March 1st at 5pm** - in our hands, not just postmarked.

We will review all applications the week after the deadline, and at that time we put together a preliminary schedule. Once that schedule is finalized, the draft is sent out to all applicants via email no later than **March 8th**. This schedule is your confirmation that you have received a slot. 
## In Loving Memory: Pat Henry 1939-2018

Pat Henry, a stalwart Folk Festival participant and advocate passed away at home on October 5, 2018 surrounded by friends, family and lots of music.

Pat, Jeanie and kids arrived in Juneau in spring of 1974, and promptly stumbled into the first Alaska Folk Festival. He fell in love with Southeast Alaska's forests, beaches, wilderness and mystery, which infiltrated his songs, along with his salty blues fingerpicking style. He sang of place and community, and called out political injustice with incisive humor.

Pat was dedicated to Juneau's musical community. Over 45 years, he served to organize, perform, and support many concerts around town. During his 10 years serving on the Folk Festival board, he lobbied for pragmatic management and advocated for opportunity and inclusion of all musical styles and abilities. He organized countless annual skills workshops, wrangled volunteer instructors, and songwriter showcases, and every festival he belted out his own newest 15 minutes of music, whether sweet or salty.

Pat loved to jam. Jeanie's kitchen welcomed every flavor of



travelling musician, instrument and style. Pat thought any time was a good time to jam (the later the better). With the heart of a friend and mentor, he encouraged every musician and every ability to participate and find their voice. When coaching the timid to release anxiety, his long southern drawl assured them... "There are many right notes."

Pat was born in 1939 in San Angelo, Texas, raised by two school teachers and ranchers. On the small family ranch, Pat wrangled rattlesnakes, caught horny toads, herded cattle, and cut cedar trees. An adventurous Eagle Scout, Pat's childhood was charmed by countless misadventures.

Music came naturally to Pat, although indirectly. As a child he resisted classical piano lessons until, to his mother's dismay, he discovered Boogie-Woogie, the Blues, and loud foot-stomping. At night, he hid beneath his bedcovers with a forbidden handheld radio, soaking up midnight blues rhythms. Perhaps unwittingly, his mother gave him a bass ukulele which soon led to blues guitar, fingerpicking, songwriting, and a lifetime of foot stomping. We are grateful for that music, and will all dearly miss his foot stomping.

# Conjunto Music

Conjunto is what many listeners first think of when Tejano music is mentioned. Tejano music, or Tex-Mex, is a lively blend of Mexican folk and U.S. & European pop influences. Germans and Poles migrated to Mexico and Texas, bringing their button accordions and oom-pah brass band musical sensibilities with them. Conjunto was born in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century by blending the accordion and its accompanying swinging march tempo with Mariachi music, and particularly with a Mexican stringed instrument known as a bajo sexto; a large 12-stringed guitar.

Tejano continued to grow and evolve alongside its cultural neighbors in the ensuing decades, with new subgenres formed by fusing rock and roll, R&B, and pop influences throughout the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Tejano's influence can be heard in many popular American artists; Ry Cooder, Calexico, and Los Lobos to name a few. Tejano continues to thrive and evolve, particularly in its home region of northern Mexico and southern Texas and California.



## Share your knowledge—lead a workshop

Weekend workshops are a **fantastic** part of the Alaska Folk Festival. Over the years, we have had music theory workshops, demonstrations of taking apart and maintaining autoharps or uilleann pipes, dancing, stagecraft, ukulele, rounds as well as countless singing, guitar, fiddle, banjo and mandolin workshop sessions.

The Guest Artists lead workshops and there are also many sessions led by volunteers. We try to cover popular instruments (fiddle, guitar, banjo, voice) and styles (flatpicking, Irish). Thankfully, we have many regulars who offer to lead most years, but there's room for more. If you have knowledge to share, please let us know how you can help.

We schedule workshops (usually 90 minutes each) on Saturday and Sunday. The idea is to encourage non-professional performers. People come to find out more about an instrument, learn a new skill, or to hear some tunes or stories. We need volunteers to start the ball rolling, present information, and encourage learning. **Leading a workshop is a GREAT way to participate in AFF!**
